



As Randolph Public Schools (RPS) continues to deepen students' learning aligned to the science of reading, we're excited to announce the RPS/ Ignite project! This project links reading services from Ignite Reading with many grade 1RPS students across the four elementary schools through a grant from the state. Ignite Reading's one-to-one, virtual, Science of Reading-based tutoring closes decoding gaps. In just 15 minutes a day, our expert tutors teach students the foundational skills they need for a lifetime of independent reading.

Dr. Hosmer, Principal at the Young School, shared her thoughts on the experience. 'Our first week of the Ignite program was terrific! Admittedly I had some wonders about how it would all work, but then listening to the students engage and watching their smiling faces, put any wonders at ease. Students are engaging each day fully and seem to be really enjoying it. I am looking forward to seeing the data so that we can continue to support students' literacy development."

Math:


Each school, class, and student keep track of their ST Math puzzle progress. On 9/29, all schools reached their goal of 5% puzzle goal progress! Amazing job!



Special Education Update (SPED)

Dear Families,

We hope this October Education Update finds yowell and thriving. We have some important updates to share with you regarding equity audits and reviews within our district.

Equity Audit Review From The Equity Process:



Firstly, we would like to inform you that the recent equity audit conducted by the Teaching Equity Project (TEP) within our community is now complete. This comprehensive assessment aimed to evaluate the equity and inclusivity of our educational practices, ensuring that every student receives the support and resources they need to succeed/Members of the RPS Leadership Team began to examine the results of the equity audit and the final report will be made available to everyone next month.

The three overarching themes that came out of the audit follows:

• THEME 1: The Audit's explicit focus on discussions of race in both curriculum and as a community is important to recognize.



Given the demographics of Randolph, and thewn's plan (https://www.randolph -ma.gov/648/Health-Equity -and-Justice) this theme's focus sees particularly relevant. Ensure that while creating future priorities, action plans, and expectations, you consider the Town's plan shown in the link above and or their most current plan should that link expire.

- THEME 2: Attention to high expectationsfor ALL while centering your SWD, students who are neurodivergent, students who are identified as BIPOC, students whose first language is not English, and students who identify as LGBTQIA+. This Audit looks at this from the perspective of classroom instrution (curriculum), program access (a more systemic view), and community beliefs, plus the over monitoring of ongoing progress. Given differences seen across grade levels, genders, race, ethnicity/culture, and ability in Randolph (particularly in the high school compared to other grades), this seems to be a theme with a productive and relevant focus area for RPS.
- THEME 3: A clear articulation of the RPS district's commitment to equity, with the particular call out to the perceived mismatch of messaging so action appears to be a challenge. You should address this challenge by forming a stakeholder group and ensuring that varied voices are shared and heard. The related processes and expected outcomes should be clear to the entire community by ensuring that communication is barrierfree and inclusive. This theme is particularly relevant as you focus on reestablishing family and community engagement, trust amongst staff, and supporting 100% of your students towards current and future successes.

District Equity Review from DESE (new!):







In addition to the TEP's audit, we are excited to share that **tMassachusetts**Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE)together with AIR (American Institute for Research) will be conducting its own equity review in our district this month. The purpose of the district review is to provide formative and actionable feedback on district practices, enabling district leaders to reflect on progress and strengthen staff and student performance.

The district's participation in this review will result in a culminating report that provides information about the strengths and challenges of current practices. The following is an overview of the schedule for sinte data collection and procedures that will take placehroughout the month of October:

- Interviews and focus groups for families, students, staff, and members of the leadership team will take place in the district during the week of October 30th. The purpose of the interviews and focus groups is to capture the voice of various stakeholder groups.
 - Should your middle school or high school student be selected for this process, we will send a consent form for your review.
- Instructional observations will take place in each school over the week of October 30th. The purpose of the classroom observations is to gauge the quality of instruction overall in the district.

We are actively working on providing you with a comprehensive and detailed update regarding the district review. Please stay tuned for these announcements in the upcoming weeks. Your patience is greatly appreciated as we strive to ensure that you receive the most thorough information possible.



SEL (Social Emotional Learning)/MH (Mental Health) Updates:

As we move further into the academic year, we want to share some important updates regarding the initiatives and programs taking place in our schools this month.

• RHS Grade 9- Break Free From Depression Curriculum:
Our 9th grade students at RHS will be embarking on a journey to enhance their emotional well-being. They will be participating in the 'Break Free From Depression" curriculum led by our dedicated school social workers. This program is designed to provide valuable insights and

support to our students as they navigate the challenges of adolescence.

- RCMS 7th Grade and RHS 9th Grade SBIRT Program:
 Ensuring the safety and well-being of our students is our top priority. To that end, both our 7th grade students at RCMS and 9th grade students at RHS will be participating in the SBIRT program (Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment). This evidence-based approach helps us identify any potential alcohol or substance-related concerns among our students. Our staff will work closely with identified students to develop personalized plans to address their needs and provide appropriate support.
- Elementary Level Toolbox Curriculum and DESSA SEL Screening
 At the elementary level, we continue to foster positive behavior and build
 a sense of community within our schools. Our dedicated educators are
 utilizing the Toolbox curriculum to encourage positive interactions and
 growth among our youngest learners. Additionally, we are pleased to
 announce that we will soon be completing the DESSA Social and
 Emotional Learning Screener. This valuable tool will help us gain a deeper
 understanding of our students' social and emotional needs, enabling us to
 provide targeted support and guidance.




RPS ESL Instruction


Family Engagement Updates


